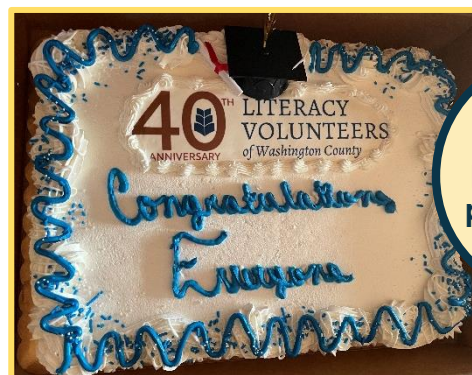


Congratulations everyone!

Tutor Tips

“We are all in the process of becoming.” Audre Lorde

Whoooo-eeeeeee! Where did this year go? Hope you have enjoyed your tutoring, through masks and mistakes, laughter and much learning. We thank you for your patience, resilience and good-natured flexibility!

As mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter, LVWC recently received a book grant through ProLiteracy, the international umbrella organization for tutoring adults. As we unpacked the lovely updated readers, dictionaries, GED and math materials, we came across a chronology of trends in teaching English to adults. I thought you might find this evolution in best practices interesting and reassuring. There is a reason why we encourage a practical, applicable, relevant, contextual approach.

Who knew? The seemingly informal approach we encourage at LVWC is called the Communicative Approach or CLT for Communicative Language Teaching (love those acronyms!). Emerging in the late 1960's, this approach emphasizes PRACTICAL language use and “integration of four language skills - listening, speaking, reading and writing - through natural, authentic, real-life activities and experiences. The students take an ACTIVE role in the learning situation so that the acquisition of English will be part of their daily lives.”

This CLT approach acknowledges that adults usually learn differently from children. They have a history of experiences on which to draw and hook new learning. They also have developed coping skills and habits to handle adult responsibilities like a job and/or family. This approach appreciates how, when and where adults learn. Recognition that adults want to, can and DO learn throughout their lifetimes underlies this approach. “Life-long learning” is a relatively modern phrase in a field that prioritizes K - 12 education.

A key component of CLT is the active role the learner takes. This is not a passive enterprise as you well know. We know that the only way our students will become better communicators is to practice, practice, practice speaking and reading and writing and listening (not in that order, of course, and many times not all at once!) You provide the safe and trusting environment for them to grow as you strive for that balance between supporting AND challenging your student(s).

This CLT strategy evolved from two earlier approaches. You may be familiar with these from your own language learning. An emphasis on learning grammatical rules, vocabulary and literature (Grammar Translation Approach) was popular after World War II. Although still used, but not in isolation from other methods, here “little connection is made between language practice and real-life communication. Emphasis is on

written translation rather than speaking and understanding.” The later Audiolingual approach in the 1950's and '60's shifted language learning to speaking and listening using repetition and oral drills.

In earlier columns this past year, I've stressed specific techniques for tutoring your student(s). Before you head off for the beach (hah!), I thought you'd appreciate being reminded that you are participating in an informed evolution in adult language learning. You have a wealth of information available. As always, if you have questions or comments, please let us know.

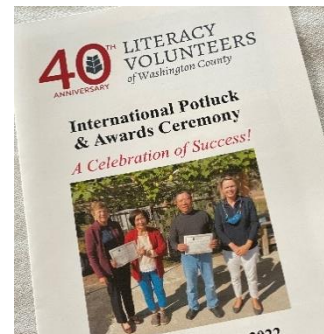

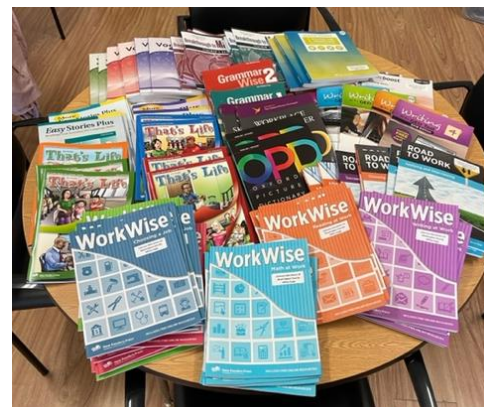
